ESTHER AND DWAYNE CLEMENT



Introduced by mutual friends in 1972 Esther and Dwayne were married on June 10, 1973. At Christmas time in 1974, Esther, a Sorrento native, and Dwayne moved into their home on Eastside Road where they have lived for 45 years. Little did they or the Town of Sorrento know what an impact that move would have on them both. Esther Perry attended grammar school in the building (now the Sorrento Community Building) right next door to where Esther Clement has worked for the past 22 years as Town Tax Collector, Town Clerk and Town Treasurer. Beginning in 1985 when she was first elected Tax Collector and for the next 12 years, Esther worked out of her home serving the Sorrento residents. When the town office was built in 1997, she and the town records were moved into the new space. In 2001 Esther became a full-time town employee. In all, Esther has served 34 years as Tax Collector, 33 years as Town Clerk, and 20 years as Town Treasurer as well as deputy registrar of voters and harbor secretary.

Dwayne, having been trained as an electrician during his navy enlistment, 1968 to 1972, continued his work back home in Ellsworth. In 2000, he retired from Bud Lee Electric. With his retirement, Dwayne was now available to do whatever it took behind the scenes to help the town selectmen continue to make Sorrento such a great place.

Dedication and service to the town have become tradition for the Clement family, Esther, Dwayne and their two sons, Brian, and Craig: Esther serving as the fire department administrative assistant for 20 years in addition to her town positions; Dwayne with 32 years of service including 13 years as an EMT and currently serving as fire department Deputy Chief in addition to his behind the scene efforts on behalf of the town; Brian with 21 years of service and presently serving as fire department Assistant Chief; and Craig with 25 years of service and now serving as fire department Chief Engineer in addition to being a town selectman.

Esther will be retiring from the town office but not the town. Although Esther and Dwayne will be missed at the town office, we can be certain that their dedication and service to the town will continue as the caring neighbors and friends they are in a place they have helped make so special.

The town wishes Esther and Dwayne all the best as they start their next adventure of enjoying more time with their family, relaxing, and traveling around the State of Maine and of course, living in Sorrento.

Dear Friends,


As I travel Maine, I hear from people who live in every corner of our state. I hear about their achievements, their successes, their work to improve their communities – I hear about the hope they have for our state. I also hear about our challenges, and all the work we have left to do. As I see it, that's my job: to listen to you, act where I can to build on what's good, and work on the tough parts. As 2018 comes to a close, I wanted to take a moment to share an update on some of the work we're doing in Washington to lift up the accomplishments of Maine people and make progress on the challenges they face.

From Portland to Presque Isle, from Milo to Camden, I hear about the pain that the opioid epidemic is inflicting on Maine communities. I've met with Maine people in recovery, family members of those struggling with substance use disorders, treatment providers, and law enforcement officials to learn about their experiences with this terrible disease, and everyone agrees that in order to fully respond to these problems, we need a stronger federal effort to end the opioid epidemic. Fortunately, some help is on the way – in October, we overwhelmingly passed a sweeping, bipartisan opioids bill. I've pushed hard for this type of legislation and was proud to have provisions I've advocated for included in the bill. These priorities have been guided by the voices of Maine people, and we'll keep working to confront this tragic problem.

I've also worked to strengthen the future of our forest economy. Maine's forests have powered our state's economy for generations, especially in our rural communities. So, when rapid shifts in the market led to the closure of many pulp and paper mills and biomass power plants, it required a collaborative approach to support future growth in this important industry. That's why, together with the other members of the state's Congressional delegation, I pushed to establish the Economic Development Assessment Team (EDAT). This integrated, multiagency effort aims to foster innovation and commercialization in Maine's forest economy, and we're already seeing the benefits: in recent months, several forest industry businesses have announced significant investments into Maine operations, and in September 2018, the Forest Opportunity Roadmap (FOR)/Maine released an action plan to make sure this industry, and the rural communities it supports, can continue to thrive for generations to come.

As I close this letter, please allow me to express my gratitude to each of you – for your dedication to our state, and to one another. It's often said that Maine is like a big small town (with very long streets)—that's because at our heart, we're one big community. It's not only a pleasure to serve you— it's a pleasure to know you. Thank you for being the reason Maine is so special. Mary and I hope that 2019 will be a good year for you, your family, your community, and our great State.

Dear Friends,

It is an honor to represent Maine in the United States Senate. I am grateful for the trust the people of our state have placed in me and welcome this opportunity to share some key accomplishments from this past year.

As Chairman of the Senate Aging Committee, I worked to help ensure the well-being of our seniors. The *SeniorSafe Act I* authored became law last year and is empowering banks, credit unions, and other financial institutions to better protect seniors from financial fraud.

Following extensive committee investigations of prescription drug pricing, additional legislation I crafted became law, ending the egregious practice of pharmacy “gag clauses” that prevented pharmacists from informing patients on how to pay the lowest possible price.

This year, I was also successful in securing an extra \$425 million for Alzheimer’s research—the largest funding increase ever—bringing the total to \$2.34 billion. Additionally, the bipartisan *BOLD Act I* authored will create public health infrastructure to combat Alzheimer’s by promoting education, early diagnosis, and improved care management.

More than 40 million Americans—including 178,000 Mainers—are caregivers for parents, spouses, children, and other loved ones with disabilities or illnesses, such as Alzheimer’s. The *RAISE Family Caregivers Act I* authored was signed into law last year, giving caregivers more resources and training to better balance the full-time job of caregiving. Another law I wrote will help grandparents who are raising grandchildren, largely due to the opioid addiction crisis.

In addition to helping seniors, a major accomplishment over the past year is the increased federal investment in biomedical research that is leading to progress in the fight against numerous devastating diseases. Congress has boosted funding for the National Institutes of Health by \$7 billion in just the last three years, bringing total funding to more than \$39 billion.

One of my highest priorities as Chairman of the Transportation Appropriations Subcommittee is to improve our nation’s crumbling infrastructure and ensure that Maine’s needs are addressed. Since the Better Utilizing Investments to Leverage Development (BUILD) Transportation Grants program, formerly known as TIGER, was established in 2009, I have secured \$160 million for vital transportation projects throughout Maine.

Congress also delivered a Farm Bill last year, which includes many important provisions that will help the agriculture industry in Maine and across the country. Specifically, I secured provisions that will strengthen support for young farmers, improve local farm-to-market efforts, and increase funding for organic research.


Congress took decisive action to address the opioid addiction epidemic. In addition to appropriating \$8.5 billion in federal funding last year, Congress enacted the *SUPPORT for Patients and Communities Act*, a comprehensive package that embraces the multipronged approach I have long advocated for this epidemic: prevention, treatment, recovery, and enforcement to stop drug trafficking.

Maine plays a key role in ensuring a strong national defense. In 2018, Congress provided funding for five ships to be built at Bath Iron Works, which will help to keep our nation safe and provide our skilled shipbuilders a steady job. I also secured more than \$162 million for infrastructure projects at Portsmouth Naval Shipyard to support their important work to overhaul Navy submarines.

A Maine value that always guides me is our unsurpassed work ethic. In December 2018, I cast my 6,834th consecutive vote, continuing my record of never missing a roll-call vote since my Senate service began in 1997.

Owners

All persons liable to taxation in the Town of Sorrento, Maine and all Administrators, Executors, Trustees, etc, of all estates taxable in said municipality of such persons are hereby notified to furnish to THE ASSESSORS TRUE AND PERFECT LIST OF ALL THEIR ESTATES, REAL AND PERSONAL, not by law exempt from taxation, of which they were possessed on the first day of April, 2020 and be prepared to make oath to the truth of the same and to answer all proper inquiries as in writing as to the nature, situation and value of their liable to be taxed.

Estates Distributed

And when estates of persons deceased have been distributed during the past year, or have changed hands from any cause, the executor, administrator, or other such persons interested, are hereby warned to give notice of such change, and in default of such notice will be held under law to pay the tax assessed although such estate have been wholly distributed and paid over.

Persons Doomed

And any person who neglects to comply with this notice is hereby barred to his right to make application to the ASSESSORS or any appeal therefrom, for any abatement of his taxes, unless he furnishes such list with his application and satisfies them that he was unable to furnish it at the time appointed.

Updates from Your Board of Selectmen

Announcing Sorrento's New Office Administrator

Esther Clement has dedicated more than 34 years to the Town of Sorrento as Tax Collector, over 33 years as Town Clerk and about 20 years as Treasurer! Esther will be retiring at the conclusion of our Annual Town Meeting on September 23rd. At last year's annual meeting the voters approved changing Esther's position of many hats to an appointed one allowing the Board of Selectmen to hire a capable individual. On July 29th we did just that and hired David F. Nichols to the new position of Office Administrator. During the next 8 weeks he will be in the town office with Esther learning the many ways that Esther has helped Sorrento's taxpayers through the years.

David is originally from Sorrento, as his parents were year-round residents. Although David and his family moved to Ellsworth early in his childhood, he has fond memories of spending summers with his grandmother Wilma Nichols, who along with her husband Fred Nichols were long-time Sorrento summer residents. These fond summer memories are just part of the reason that David is excited and honored to be working in the Town Office.

David received a Master's of Business Administrator degree from Husson University and brings financial and administrative understanding, gained through both his prior work and educational experiences. David looks forward to serving the needs of the Town Office and the people of Sorrento.

Fisherman's Floats

At last year's Annual Town Meeting the voters approved funds to match a possible grant from the State of Maine Small Harbor Improvement program. The grant was approved this year and the bid process is underway. This string of floats will be positioned East of the boat ramp and will be held in place with pilings. It will be available for boat ramp users while launching and re-trailering their boats as well as providing dock space for fishermen to tie up and leave their skiffs.

Protection of the Town's Shoreline

The Town is looking for Sorrento residents to join a committee who would like to get involved in helping to protect the Town's shoreline. This help could include surveying areas in need, looking for and applying for funding, planting vegetation or donating money.

Replacement of Sumner High School

Preliminary design of the new Middle/High School is complete and was approved by the RSU 24 District's voters. The final design is underway. Sorrento is still looking for someone to coordinate our capital donation campaign.

Training of the Junior Selectmen

Upon my return to chairing the Sorrento Board of Selectmen I promised Craig and Greg that I would do my best to train them to be able to take on the fiscal responsibilities of the Town which I have done for many years. This year we will be posting that the Board of Selectmen will be meeting Wednesdays other than the first and third which is when we meet to work on Town business as well as Sunday mornings. Maine law requires that a meeting of a quorum of a board must be announced at least a week in advance and allow the public to witness. The availability of legal meetings are obviously necessary for training. So if you see a couple of trucks parked outside of the Town Office on a Sunday, feel free to come in. The meeting is open to the public but is for training purposes only and the selectmen cannot answer your questions at these meetings.

Sorrento's Website

Several years back Lily Van Sluys volunteered to start a blog to get Sorrento's newsletter online. It received a lot of traffic and provided a great service to our residents and visitors and I want to thank Lily for her efforts. This blog showed how important it is for us to have a Town website with many of the documents which are available at the Town Office but could easily be accessed if they were available online. Unfortunately completing the website has taken a backseat to the more pressing tasks at hand. I promise you when it does go online you will find it invaluable!

Communication is very important. This year our Sorrento Newsletter is now only available if you request the paper version to be mailed to you or the electronic version to be emailed. SORRENTO FIRE DEPARTMENT

The Sorrento Fire and Rescue department responded to 137 calls from July 1, 2018 to June 30, 2019. Thirty-seven of these calls were emergency medical services related within the town as well as mutual aid calls from surrounding towns. The one hundred fire related calls ranged from residential fires including chimney fires, dryer fires, electric fires, brush and grass fires, control burns, trees down across roads and wires, utility lines down, alarms sounding, false alarms, motor vehicle accidents, missing person, mutual aid and standby for other departments. There were twelve training opportunities that help keep the department current and compliant. The department also had twenty-nine work sessions for the year in and around the fire station or vehicles that involved countless numbers of man hours. In all, the men and women of the Sorrento Fire Department answered the call to duty 137 times for fire calls, EMS calls, training sessions, or work sessions. Not included in this figure is the number of man hours spent on paperwork and phone calls.

Mutual aid calls give the department an opportunity to utilize the skills that have been learned in other than a training scenario. The department's membership and mutual aid agreements with the departments of the Schoodic Region Emergency Services Association (SRESA) consisting of Eastbrook, Franklin, Gouldsboro, Hancock, Sullivan, Winter Harbor and now Steuben, provide a way to address critical manpower shortages experienced by all volunteer organizations throughout the day and night. SRESA continues to provide a forum for regular meetings every other month to discuss upcoming mutual trainings, equipment updates, NFPA requirements, and issues involving fire/EMS training, equipment compliance, etc. at both the state and federal level.

Routine equipment and apparatus maintenance is critical to insure their operation in times of emergency. This maintenance keeps personnel familiar with the operation of the equipment and apparatus, but also serves to catch problems early enough to have less effect on their use and the budget. Periodic oil changes, lubrication, and the correction of problems that surface as the apparatus or equipment is used are all part of this maintenance. In addition, the fire station is maintained and repaired as needed.

Keeping track of the paperwork from the various governmental agencies and the insurance companies that keep the department current and compliant is part of the responsibilities of Deputy Chief Dwayne Clement. Constant updating of department records to avoid possible fines during a spot check by one of the agencies is required. Also, he tracks equipment purchases, deliveries, and payments. His efforts are behind the scenes, but are time consuming and essential.

Assistant Chief Brian Clement spends many additional hours behind the scenes making sense of and inputting data of emergency calls into the new state computer program for the National Fire Incident Reporting System (NFIRS). This fulfills department and grant requirements as well as adds to the national data base on the types of calls that fire departments nationwide experience.

The finance committee continues to maintain the delicate balance of keeping expenses in check but also keeping the department's equipment updated and in good condition. The committee is well aware of the economic realities of today and will continue to try not to significantly impact the overall town budget. Donations from town residents provide the department with additional funds that continue to supplement the annual budget. The careful management of the budget funds and the donations has given the department the opportunity to offset costs.

Grant monies are sought yearly. The grants, such as the FEMA Assistance to Firefighters Grant, Forestry Grants and Maine Municipal Association grants, if obtained after competition with hundreds of other applicants, provide the department with help to offset costs of mandated equipment or obtain equipment otherwise not able to be afforded. Forestry grants and Maine Municipal Association grants when received help to purchase necessary and needed firefighter protective gear.

As winter approaches, the department would like to remind everyone that access to your property as the snow piles up is essential for both the fire department and emergency medical services to be able to make a timely entry. The better the access is the better the chance should be of a good outcome if help is needed. The use of alternative heat sources brings a reminder of more awareness of home fire safety. Please remember that portable generators should not be run inside of your home or in a structure such as a garage or shed. The consequences can be deadly.

We would like to thank the residents of the Sorrento community for their cooperation in practicing fire prevention and fire safety. Remember burn permits are required and must be obtained before you burn. Please help us help you to have yet another fire safe year.

Please continue to report any sightings of fire, smells of smoke, wires down, trees on wires, or trees in the road by calling 911 immediately. Do not touch or attempt to move any wires that are down. It is much better to have us investigate and find nothing or something small before it gets out of control. Proper house numbering helps us find the scene faster at a time when seconds count in averting a tragedy. It is very important for all of us to be very observant in keeping our neighbors and town fire safe.

New members are always welcome to join the special group of men and women who are the Sorrento Fire Department! We will be glad to answer any questions you might have. There are plenty of things that must be done to keep the fire station and department running and you just might find out you would like to help us. We also encourage residents to stop in when you see us at the station. We will be glad to show you around!

We appreciate the support given to the department by the residents of the town and will continue to strive to fulfill our mission to serve and protect.

The 2019/2020 budget represents no increase over the 2018/2019 budget. Costs to the Fire Department particularly mandated yearly equipment maintenance and inspections as well as equipment repairs and upgrades and fluctuating prices are continuing thus far to be managed by the department through a combination of the budget, grants, and the donations made by the residents. The Fire Department understands very well the economic realities faced by everyone and continues to try to have as little impact as possible on the overall Town budget and still fulfill its mission to serve and protect.

SORRENTO RESCUE/EMS REPORT

The Sorrento Rescue/EMS answered a total of 37 calls for either Basic Life Support (BLS) or Advanced Life Support (ALS) Emergency Medical Assistance from July 1, 2018 to June 30, 2019. These calls included people who were sick, fell, suffered heart attacks or strokes, lacerations, lift assists, motor vehicle accidents, etc. Mutual aid agreements with other members of the Schoodic Region have provided the opportunity to give more complete coverage to the area in the event that personnel are not readily available. Mutual aid keeps the department busy, but it continues to allow the members to put their skills to good use and at the same time know that help from other towns is available if need be.

Department members must continue to take Continuing Education Hours (CEH) as required by Maine State law to keep their licenses current. These courses insure that the members have the skills to help you in your time of need regardless of what the problem might be. Training is essential and takes a lot of unseen man hours both on the computer and actual class time over three years to acquire.

Please remember to call 9-1-1 for any kind of emergency. In order to help us find you quickly, please be sure your 9-1-1 address numbers are correct and visible. This is especially important when other departments are coming to assist us in helping you.

Remember, minutes count in the event of an emergency. As winter approaches, the department would like to remind you that easy access to your property and you are essential in case of an emergency.

The department wishes to thank all the residents who have donated to the Sorrento Rescue/EMS. These donations help to purchase needed medical supplies and equipment so that the department can be prepared when you are in need.

As always, the department is looking for new members for the Sorrento Rescue/EMS team. If you have any interest, please contact us.

A big thank-you goes out to all the members for their dedicated service. Also, another big thank-you to the families of the members for their understanding of the time required to volunteer to assist those in need.

ROAD COMMISSIONER REPORT

The work on the Town's roads has been ongoing during 2018-2019. As a result of the almost continuous wet weather, it has been difficult to get contractors to do work in a timely fashion due to a backlog. More work will be done this fall, including brush and tree cutting and removal and road patching and shoulder grading. Hopefully, weather permitting, this will be completed before winter begins.

A review of the roads considered to be in the poorest condition is still being discussed with the selectmen to determine which will have to be paved. This process is dependent on the cost of the hot top which is now locally estimated at \$120,00.00 per mile. More reasonable prices are being sought in an effort to bring down costs.

In the areas of the town pier, boat ramp, dentist office, and Fuller road, seasonal speed bumps have been installed to increase safety for both pedestrians and vehicles.

EMA REPORT

During last winter the Town of Sorrento had both cold, snowy days and rainy days. Some trees and power lines came down but were taken care of as quickly as possible. Spring saw even more days of rain that caused significant run-off from both the snow melt and rain. The increased rainfall has thus far continued through the summer.

As always in the event of a big storm, the fire department will be out checking for damage such as trees and overhead wires down, and washed out roads. Reports from the town residents regarding their neighborhoods continue to be a great help to the fire department. Remember: DO NOT GO NEAR a downed line or one that is tangled in a downed tree. CALL 9-1-1 to have the fire department dispatched to check it out. The fire department has a special tool that will indicate if a downed line is one that is electrically charged or not.

The Incident Command System (ICS) is utilized to keep the fire and rescue department up-to-date and compliant. The time and effort to do the training and make use of the ICS by the emergency services personnel is gratefully acknowledge.

Likewise, the continued cooperation of the residents of the Town of Sorrento is very much appreciated

PUBLIC SAFETY REPORT

A big thank you to all the residents of the Town of Sorrento for their safety consciousness in 2018-2019. Your reporting of damaged, removed, or spray-painted street signs is the type of information necessary to repair or replace them as soon as possible. These signs are very important for emergency services personnel, especially fire, police, and medical, as well as utility companies to find the correct address.

A critical part of public safety is for residents to accurately use the 9-1-1 address that has been assigned to their property. The mailbox and/or home should clearly display your 9-1-1 address to allow quick identification.

Smoke and CO2 detector batteries should be replaced when the clocks are turned back one hour. This "FALL BACK 1 HOUR" will take place on Sunday, November 3, 2019.

Also, easy access to your property and residence should be maintained for everyone's safety. This includes the timely reporting of downed trees and power lines in your area. Power lines could be entangled and hidden in the downed trees. **NEVER TOUCH LOW HANGING OR DOWNED POWER LINES AS THEY MAY STILL BE ENERGIZED.**

As the fall and winter seasons approach, residents are urged to check over those items they feel they will need ahead of time rather than at the last minute. Please check carefully any alternative heat sources before using them.

PLEASE REMEMBER: DO NOT RUN PORTABLE GENERATORS INSIDE OF YOUR HOUSE OR ANY OTHER STRUCTURE, INCLUDING GARAGES AND SHEDS.

For more than two decades the Sorrento Scholarship Committee, supported by the Town of Sorrento and the generosity of private donors, has been able to provide additional funds for students who pursue post high school education. Through this collaboration, students who live in Sorrento have been able to pay for coursework, purchase books, pay for transportation, and have money for general expenses when they continue on with their education. We are grateful for the support that the Town has shown for this scholarship fund.

Numbers of students, age and grade appropriate, have dwindled significantly in recent years. Sumner High School reports that the following numbers represent students enrolled at each grade level for the 2019-2020 school year:

This past year we had one student who received funds from the Sorrento Scholarship Fund.

To qualify for a Sorrento Scholarship, students must have Sorrento as their primary residence for the previous twelve months and anticipate that their legal residence will continue to be Sorrento for the next twelve months. Students must be under 25 years of age, and be full time students when enrolled in coursework. Students who maintain academic standards are eligible to receive \$950.00 after their first semester (when grades are sent with the request) and then every semester after that. To provide an additional incentive, students are eligible for \$50.00 for every "A" or equivalent that they receive while they are eligible for the Sorrento Scholarship. Over the years students have reported that this was a big help and a positive reinforcement for their hard work.

At the present time, the Sorrento Scholarship Fund balance is \$21,809.30, which is anticipated to be enough to help 2 students over a four year period. We have been very fortunate to have the support of the Town in these efforts to help our young people (and their families) as they could go on with their education. We hope you will be able to continue that support. Our students have been fortunate and proud to say that they live in Sorrento, a town that helps young people as they continue their learning !

- 1) Total Coliform Bacteria: Reported as the highest monthly number of positive samples, for water systems that take less than 40 samples per month.
- 2) E. Coli: E. coli are bacteria whose presence indicates that the water may be contaminated with human or animal wastes. EPA continues to research the health effects of low levels of arsenic, which is a mineral known to cause cancer in humans at high concentrations and is linked to other health effects such as skin damage and circulatory problems. Quarterly urine uric acid is based on running annual average.
- 7) Gross Alpha: Action level over 5 pCi/L requires testing for Radium 226 and 228. Action level over 15 pCi/L requires testing for Uranium. Compliance is based on Gross Alpha results minus Uranium results = Net Gross Alpha.
- 8) Radon: The State of Maine adopted a Maximum Exposure Guideline (MEG) for Radon in drinking water at 4000 pCi/L, effective 1/1/07. If Radon exceeds the MEG in water, treatment is recommended. It is also advisable to test indoor air for Radon.
- 9) TTHM/HAA5: Total Trihalomethanes and Haloacetic Acids (TTHM and HAA5) are formed as a by-product of drinking water chlorination. This chemical reaction occurs when chlorine combines with naturally occurring organic matter in water. Compliance is based on running annual average.

Health Information

9. To see if the Town will vote to raise \$20,000 and appropriate from Surplus 10,000 for the Capital Improvement Fund which is dedicated to the purpose of paying for high cost capital improvement expenditures incurred by the Town without abruptly raising taxes or obtaining loan

10. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate \$2,000 to the Shoreline Improvement Account, "SHIP", along with any donations, to maintain, improve and repair the Town's public shoreline property.

11. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate \$5,500 for the Sorrento Community Building to cover running expenses, with any remainder to be transferred into the Community Building Committee's checkbook
12. To see if the Town will vote to raise \$5,000 and appropriate \$10,000 from surplus for the Fire Truck Fund. Money from this fund can only be withdrawn by voter appropriation for Fire Truck replacement.
13. To see if the Town will vote to authorize the Selectmen to accept for the Town gifts or grants of money from Federal, State or private sources.
14. To see if the Town will vote to authorize the Selectmen to dispose of all property held by tax liens on such terms as they deem advisable, and execute quit claim deeds for such property providing any such sale is advertised in the Ellsworth American for 30 days and the Sorrento Newsletter for at least one time prior to such sale so that all may have an opportunity to bid on same.
